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


Church of Our Lady of Victories, Prague

he Church of Our Lady of Victories in Prague is a captivating site that stands as a testament to faith and resilience. Nestled in the heart of the city, it invites visitors to explore its rich history and admire stunning artwork reflecting the enduring spirit of the community it has served for centuries. Originally built for German Lutherans around 1611, it was transferred to Catholic friars and nuns by the Holy Roman Emperor Ferdinand II in 1624. In that same year, the church was consecrated to Our Lady of Victories and Saint Anthony of Padua.

The church's design is striking both inside and out, showcasing the highly decorative and theatrical baroque architectural style that emerged in Italy in the late 16th century and spread across Europe. Inside, visitors can admire numerous paintings and statues, many created by the Czech artist Petr Brandl. The church is extensively adorned with real gold, as well as bronze, copper, and silver.



The primary reason people visit the Church of Our Lady of Victories is to see the Infant Jesus of Prague statue. This 16th-century statue is believed by many to possess miraculous powers, drawing pilgrims from around the globe. Many people report being miraculously healed from illnesses after praying to Infant Jesus. During the Swedish siege of Prague in 1639, believers prayed to Infant Jesus for protection, and the city was spared from destruction.

When you visit the Church of Our Lady of Victories, you're immersed in history, spirituality, and stunning baroque architecture. As you walk through its serene halls, you're drawn to the miraculous statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague, feeling the divine presence. The beautiful baroque architecture, combined with intricate artworks and historical relics, captivates your senses. Each step connects you to centuries of devotion and faith, leaving you with a deep sense of awe. This sacred place intertwines history and the divine, making it an unforgettable part of your journey.


Syro-Malabar Eparchy of Chicago celebrated the Holy Qurbana. I was thrilled to hear a Malayalam song during communion.

sessions, there was adoration, and more than 50,000 people came to adore the Lord. The adoration was beautiful, with lovely songs and








amazing people coming together to worship our Lord.

John Marie Vianney was born into a farming family at Dardilly,

France on 8th May 1786 and baptised that day. He was the fourth

of six children born to Matthieu and Marie Vianney. He was raised in

a devout family and they often helped the poor.



When John was twenty years old, he left the farm to undertake his studies in Maths, History, Geography and Latin. His studies were disrupted in 1809 as the French government made him go into the army to fight a war for Napoleon. However,

As he was now free, John returned to Écully and restarted his studies. In 1812, he attended a minor seminary, Abbe Balley and became a deacon eventually in June 1815. He was able to join his heroes as a priest on 12th August 1815 in the Couvent des Minimes de Grenoble. His first Mass was celebrated the next day and he was appointed assistant priest.

QAS A CATHOLIC CHRISTIAN, CAN YOU GO TO WAR?

ANS To be honest, the shortest answer is, it depends. First, let us have clarity on the Commandment, thou shall not kill; our Lord asked for peace of heart and denounced murderous anger and hatred as immoral.

The fifth Commandment forbids the intentional destruction of human life. However, 'as long as the danger of war persists and there is no international authority with the

and

necessary competence and power, governments cannot be denied the right of lawful self-defence, once all peace efforts have failed.' (CCC) 2307-8, 2266)

Now, respect for development of human life require peace. Peace cannot be attained on earth safeguarding without the goods of persons, communication among men, respect for the dignity of persons and peoples, and the assiduous practice of fraternity. Peace is 'the tranquillity of order.' (CCC 2304)

The Second Vatican Council stated, 'Those who are pledged to the service of their country as members of its armed forces should regard themselves as agents of security and freedom on behalf of their people. As long as they fulfil this role properly, they are making a genuine contribution to the establishment of peace. (Gaudium et Spes, No. 79) So, a soldier does not necessarily need to confess his killing of other soldiers in combat. Provided that the war is

> **just,** this killing is not a sin as it is not the taking of an innocent human life; it is stopping an unjust aggressor for the sake of the common good.

Going to battle for the sake of a just cause is noble. It is noble in the same way that defending one's family from an intruder is noble. **But it** is not pretty. It is not glorious.

But it can be virtuous if done properly: according to the teachings of the Church, and with a formed and attuned conscience. But it is ugly. We ought to be extremely grateful for those soldiers who have, and continue to, risk their lives doing this very difficult service.

MATERIALS REQUIRED

- A4 craft paper: green, white and any colour you prefer
- Scissor/paper cutter Scale Pencil Glue

PROCEDURE

- I. Take the green colour craft sheet.
- 2 (a). Make two parallel lines along both edges at the distance of 1.5 cm.
- 2 (b). On each line mark at the intervals of cm. Join the corresponding points on each side.
- 3. Fold the paper in half and cut along the lines.
- 4. Take the white paper and cut two 1.5 cm wide strips.
- 5&6. Paste the strips on both edges of the green sheet.
- 7. Fold the sheet lengthwise and glue the long edges along the 1.5 cm margin.
- 8&9. Now paste both the ends together to make a ring.
- 10. Cut out small circles and stars on different coloured craft paper.
- II&I2. Fold another green colour paper to make the holder.
- 13. Stick the stars.
- 14. Stick the holder and hang it. You can make a bow with paper and attach it as well.



MATERIALS REQUIRED

- Brown paper bag
- Black paint

- Brown paint
- Black pen
- Red paint
- Jute thread (optional)













PROCEDURE

Step 1: Cut the brown paper bag and spread it open to create a sheet.

Step 2: Dip your index finger in brown paint and stamp it onto the paper.

Step 3: Using red paint, fingerprint reindeer nose, as shown in picture.

Step 4: Draw reindeer antlers using a black pen.

Step 5: For eyes, add two small dots using black paint and a thin brush.

Step 6: Allow the paint to dry completely.

Step 7: Wrap your gift, and if desired, tie with jute thread for a rustic touch.

It is referenced 280 times in the Bible, from Genesis to Revelation.


