Sandiego de Compostela Cathedral, Spain - TOBY DINOOP » 14 YRS » MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA

The Sandiego de Compostela Cathedral remains one of the most important cathedrals in the world as it is the burial place of the apostle, St. James the Elder. It is also important in Spain because it marks the end of the 790 kilometres (490 miles) that make up the Camino de Santiago pilgrimage route.

The Apostle St. James

St. James was the brother of John the Evangelist, sons of Zebedee, James was one of the three privileged disciples, together with Peter and John, to be present with Jesus at important moments of his life, like the Transfiguration and his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. As recorded in Acts 12:2, James was beheaded by Herod Agrippa in the year 43 AD. Tradition narrates that his body was taken by sea from Jerusalem to Galicia, and was buried in a forest, today the site of the Cathedral.

Camino de Santiago

The Camino de Santiago or Way of St. James is a pilgrimage of medieval origin, a series of roads through France and Spain, to the cathedral, with pilgrims walking, cycling or riding on horseback.

Ano Xacobeo

When the feast of St. James -July 25th - falls on a Sunday,


that year is called a Holy Year or Ano Xacobeo. During this year, the Holy Door in the cathedral, Porta Santa is opened for the whole year. Pilgrims who visit the cathedral, pray and attend Mass during the Holy Year, obtain a full plenary indulgence. 2021 is a Compostela Holy Year!



SOME FACTS

- The only other churches built atop a tomb of Jesus's apostles are St. Peter's Basilica, Rome and St. Thomas Cathedral Basilica, Chennai, India
- The Tomb of St. James also contains remains of his disciples, St. Athanasius and St. Theodore.
- The Holy Door is also known as the Forgiveness Door.
- The Cathedral is also home to the famous Botafumeiro. which dispenses clouds of incense, dates back to the mid-19th century.
- ♣ A scallop shell is worn on pilgrims to show that they are walking the Camino de Santiago.

(Romans 8: 26).



History of the

aster Sunday, proclaiming our Lord's resurrection, is a focal celebration in the yearly cycle of the Church. But unlike Christmas which falls on December 25th each year, Easter does not have a fixed date. The story of assigning an apt place on the calendar for this celebration of hope and renewal is a particularly interesting one that spans centuries.

According to the Bible, Jesus Christ's death and resurrection occurred at the time of the Jewish Passover, which was celebrated on the first full moon following the vernal equinox (March equinox) - when the Sun is exactly above the Equator. In the Northern Hemisphere the vernal equinox occurs around March 20 or 21, when the Sun moves north and crosses the celestial equator. The vernal equinox also marks the beginning of spring. In 325 AD, the Council of Nicaea established that Easter would be held on the first Sunday after the first full moon, occurring on or after the vernal equinox. From that point

forward, the Easter date depended on the ecclesiastical approximation of March 21 for the vernal equinox, based on the Julian calendar.

The Julian calendar was introduced by Roman Emperor Julius Caesar in 46 BC for the entire Roman Empire. It was the official calendar for Christianity for the first 1500 vears. But the Julian calendar had some errors. According to it a year was 365 days and 6 hours, when in reality it is about 365 days 5 hours and 49 minutes. Because of this inaccuracy, the vernal equinox began to be marked 10 days earlier, by the 16th century.

The Catholic Church thought this as a serious issue and Pope Paul III (1468-1549) recruited several astronomers, principally the Jesuit priest, Fr. Christopher Clavius (1537-1612), to come up with a solution. They built upon calendar reform proposals by the astronomer and physician Luigi Lilio (1510-1576). When Pope Gregory XIII was elected in 1572, he found various proposals for calendar

reform before him.

In 1582, he commissioned a new calendar to correct the errors of the Julian calendar.

The small difference between the two calendars (365 days and 6 hours minus 365 days 5 hours and 49 minutes) amounted to a difference of 11 minutes in a year. This error of 11 minutes in each year of the Julian calendar accumulated to 1 day in a span of 131 years. So, when the error was corrected from the time of the Council of Nicaea (325 AD) to 1582 AD, there resulted a difference of 9.59 days*.

It was decided that 10 days were to be removed in an attempt to restore the date of the vernal equinox to (about) the same date

in 325 AD. By the papal bull Inter gravissimas of 24 February 1582, it was decreed that the day after Thursday, 4th October 1582 would be the 15th, not the 5th of October. The new calendar came to be known as the Gregorian calendar because of the involvement of Pope Gregory XIII. In the Julian calendar a year is a leap year if it is divisible by 4. In the Gregorian calendar a year is a leap year if either (i) it is divisible by 4 but not by 100 or (ii) it is divisible by 400. Thus a new rule for leap years was established in the Gregorian calendar.





Poland, and shortly thereafter in France and Luxembourg. The Gregorian calendar was adopted in Britain (and in the British colonies) in 1752, with (Wednesday) September 2, 1752, being followed immediately by (Thursday) September 14, 1752. In this way the Gregorian calendar was gradually accepted worldwide.

It is quite interesting to note that today a majority of the world's population uses the Gregorian calendar without realising its long and interesting history, and the interventions of the Catholic Church in the journey to its present form o







THE PROBLEM WITH SPIRITUAL PERFECTIONISM

All through life, I've strived to be the best, be it studying, reading, writing and well...you get the idea. On the surface, this doesn't seem a bad thing. Being intrinsically motivated meant that my parents didn't have to nag me to study or promise me rewards if I did well in school. I was the one spending sleepless nights for my finals even when they asked me to 'chill out'. I was the one doing all the work in group projects because I wanted to control the outcome to my liking. In short, I was a worrier and a perfectionist. I couldn't stand getting a B. I couldn't stand the thought of doing poorly in my first attempt at anything, even if it was something basic as learning a new instrument. If it was something that I couldn't do perfectly, I wouldn't try at all.

Recently, while listening to *The Fr. Mike Schmitz Catholic Podcast*, I heard the speaker say, 'Just because I can't influence everything doesn't mean I can't influence anything'. That really struck a chord within me. Many a time, even in spiritual matters, perfectionism can be dangerous. It often arrives guised as virtue but ends up serving a great deal of trouble.




ST. THERESE OF LISIEUX



May your quardian angel keep you safe .

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

























Moods swings in teens is very normal.

It's part of growing up. If one does not have mood swings then probably one should check it out - hey joking! These swings should generally calm down as one slowly moves up the teen years. It is expected that by young adulthood this stormy phase should calm or at least reduce - which does not mean it will be peaceful always - but the frequency and intensity generally subsides.



Well from a physical aspect there are a lot of body changes including hormonal changes happening; from a social aspect it's a way for teens to step up and show that s/he is becoming an adult (does not mean that one SHOULD have these mood swings for that); from a psychological aspect the teen years are a bit of a confusing age - neither there as an adult nor here as a child - so the mood swings happen.

matter if your child pays you a lot of attention or technically needs you to be there. They will appreciate the effort.

Research shows both parents and children benefit when parents are involved. This not only builds the child's rapport with you, but also enhances their self-esteem. You also get to understand your child's development more intimately, know what your child is learning daily and develop social networks with other parents of similar-aged children.

Of course, beyond simply showing up in your child's life, you should know the importance of *Being Present*. More than just being physically there, it is also about being connected emotionally and mentally to your surroundings. We often hear that Catholic parents are called to become saints and to raise saints. One of the qualities that saints possess is presence. For instance, St. Mother Theresa, St. Pope John Paul II and St. Pio all knew how to make you

s we discussed in the previous issues, the foundation of effective discipline is parent-child rapport. And there are 12 secrets (tools) to build rapport with your child. We have already seen the first four secrets, Say the Love Words, Show Them You Love Them, Play Together and Work Together.

This month, let's learn the fifth secret which is, 'Be There.'

As you know being a parent is a full-time job. It can be hard to balance everything, sometimes that means making tough choices between being involved with your child's activities and other things that require your attention. Still you have to make it a point to attend

activities your child is involved in. Of course, you must be there for important things like big games, recitals, plays and other especially significant activities, but as much as possible, be there even for the simple things like watching gymnastics or karate practice. It doesn't

feel as if you were the only person in the world that mattered, whether they spent five seconds or five hours with you. We must learn to model and teach presence to our children. Begin by making sure to actually listen to your children. Too often we tune them out because we think they don't have anything of relevance to say to whatever is going on in our own lives. But when we do this, we are missing an important opportunity to bond with our kids. When your children are talking, force yourself to look at them in their eyes. Give appropriate feedback. Ask questions about what they are saying. Complement them on their insight when they offer a particularly good one. Your efforts to respectfully and actively listen to your child will pay off in their willingness to listen to you o



BOOSTING MEMORY

ouldn't we all love to have a photographic, razor-sharp memory that would help us ace every test and every exam we will ever have to face? While some special people are blessed with photographic memories, the rest of us can develop our mental faculties and ability to retain and remember.



HERE ARE SOME WAYS IN WHICH WE CAN IMPROVE MEMORY:

1. Pay Attention

When we study, a lot of things can distract us and prevent us from learning well. Try to get rid of these distractions and sit in a place free from such diversions. This will help pay attention to the subject to be learnt.

2. Not a Good Idea to Cram

Many students leave learning for just before the exams. This is not a healthy habit as our mind needs time to process information. Students who study regularly perform better than those who cram.

3. Using Mnemonics

Mnemonics are a technique that help recall. For example: 'Eat An Apple As A Nice Snack' can help you remember the continents (Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, Antartica, North America, South America).

4. Visualise

You can learn effectively by using flash cards, drawing charts, figures or other graphics in your textbook. These help visualise the information you study.

5. Read Aloud

By reading aloud, you are reading as well as listening. This helps to remember things better. Another way is to teach someone else what you are trying to learn.

6. Pay Extra Attention to What's Difficult

Do you have the habit of leaving the difficult subject last to study? Well, don't. It is best to spend more time on a difficult subject when you mind is fresh - that means tackling difficult subjects first!

7. Sleep is Important!

We usually neglect our sleep, especially when exams are around. Well, sleep actually is very important for memory and learning. Taking a nap after you learn something new helps you remember it quicker. So a good night's sleep is very important!





