
The way we respect our parents says a lot about how we show respect to God. Honouring our father and our mother teaches us how to honour our Heavenly Father better.






 - Tell your parents you love them.









When a small child is asked by her father or mother to jump into their arms from a height – she will. But if a stranger were to ask – will they jump? NO. Simply because they believe



All About St Philip Neri




Facts about st Philip Neri

- St Philip Neri was a Christian missionary who founded the Congregation of the Oratory, a community of Catholic priests and lay brothers.
- Dominican monastery of San Marco in Florence.
- When he was 18, Philip was sent to a rich relative in San Germano, to assist and hopefully inherit the family business. Soon after he reached, he had a mystical conversion experience.
- Losing interest in owning or taking the business forward, Philip felt called by the Holy Spirit to serve the Lord and His Church, and left for Rome.
- After two years of solitary life, and three years of studies, Philip set out to help the poor and re-evangelise the city of Rome.
- He loved conversing with people, his warm nature and sense of humour attracting people to him. He loved to share the Gospel and help people discover or rediscover their faith in Jesus.
- Philip was respected and loved throughout Rome; he became a trusted advisor to popes, kings, cardinals and equally as important to the poor.

METHOD

Step 1: Cut out the templates and cardboard to size.

Step 2: Wrap the foil around the cardboard cutout.

Step 3: Place the template over the foil-covered cutout and draw over the image to get the imprint on the foil. Repeat for both templates.

Step 4: Stick foilcovered cutouts together using double-sided tape.

Your Miraculous Medal is ready! You can colour this carefully with sketch pens if you want.

TIPS

Make sure to wrap the foil tight around the cardboard/foam.



Q. HOW LONG DO WE STAY IN PURGATORY?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines purgatory as a 'purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven,' which is experienced by those 'who die in God's grace

of the elect, is entirely different from the punishment of the damned' (CCC 1031).

Purification is necessary because, as Scripture teaches, nothing unclean will enter the presence of God in heaven (Revelations 21:27) and, while we may die with our mortal sins forgiven, there can still be many impurities in us, specifically venial sins and the temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven.

The length of time souls detained in Purgatory depends on:

- 1. The number of their faults
- 2. The malice and deliberation with which these have been committed
- 3. The penance done, or not done, the satisfaction made, or not made for sins during life
- 4. Much, too, depends on the suffrages offered for them after death

Speaking of the amount of time in purgatory, we should ask how time is measured in purgatory. It may not be the same way we measure time here on earth, we only know that it has a beginning and an end. The duration in purgatory is different for each individual, based on their life (their sinfulness). It is God who determines the amount of time spent. Only thing we know is that it is not eternal, one will definitely move on to Heaven.

TITLES HELD BY THE POPE

Bishop of Rome; Vicar of Jesus Christ; Successor to the Prince of the Apostles; Supreme Pontiff of the Universal Church; Patriarch of the West; Primate of Italy; Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Province of Rome; Sovereign of the Vatican City; and Servant of the Servants of God.





THE PAPAL FLAG

The papal flag consists of two equal vertical stripes of yellow and white (with the insignia of the papacy on the white stripe), a triple tiara over two crossed keys, one of gold and one of silver, tied with a red cord and two tassels. The divisions of the tiara represent the teaching, sanctifying and governing offices of the pope. The keys symbolise his role as the successor of St Peter and the universal spiritual authority of the Holy Father. The papal flag is also a national flag as it represents the sovereign state of Vatican City.



WHO ARE THE 'GENTLEMEN OF HIS HOLINESS'?


The Gentlemen of His Holiness are priests and lay persons who have the honour of serving the pope in duties reminiscent of a valet. They care for the vestments of the pope, make his travel arrangements, and take care of his furnishings. Formerly known as 'Papal Chamberlains of the Sword and Cape' they are also called 'The Papal Gentlemen'.

On Sunday, the teacher began catechism with a question, 'Boys and girls, what do we know about God?'


A hand shot up in the air.
